### Kerrisdale bows out of Top-10



Third at Roses


A husband and wife Kerrisdale club team tied for third place at the Rose Garden Mixed Fours tournament in Coquitlam on June 22.

# Good luck comes in Threes



Kerrisdale club members closed out the month of June with a bang at the Bowls BC provincial men's and women's two-bowl triples championships.

Associate member Sarina Mak took the gold medal in the women's triples final for a second straight season, sharing the victory over a North Vancouver threesome in the gold-medal final held at Stanley Park LBC on June 29.

Sarina's team of Vivien Chan and Gigi Chan from Richmond defeated two other Kerrisdale associates, Lisa Cheung and Alice Lam, in the semifinal.

The two-time, gold-medal winners made it through to the final day of knockout play, qualifying in the final eighth spot with a modest 2-3 record after two days of preliminary round play.

However, on Sunday, Sarina and Co. made the very best of their opportunity, knocking off the No. 1 seed Lorraine Choi of Richmond in the opening game of the knockout stage to begin their march to the goldmedal final.



In the consolation final for third place, Lisa and Alice, along with Rainbow Lung of

Richmond, went on to beat Kerrisdale club member Suphin Nakutnok 11-8 in the consolation final to claim the provincial bronze medal.

David and Alan qualified for Sunday's play as the seventh seed with a

record of 3-2 but lost their knockout match to Cary Manns, who went on to place fourth overall in the 20-team field.

Kin On Lau of Richmond took the gold medal, beating Coquitlam's Rick Applegath in the men's provincial final.

An intermediate-level threesome, including second-year skip Mehdi Bahrami from Stanley Park, were popular bronze-medal winners with the partisan host crowd.
